Mohave County courts are ready to issue marriage licenses for same-sex couples if and when a federal strikes down Arizona's marriage ban, court clerk Virlynn Tinnell

orders rejecting a half dozen marriage bans on Monday, a flurry of action across the country has left people in nearly 20 states wondering how much longer their bans will hang on.

Tinnell said the clerk's office has been paying attention to the marriage rulings as it has become more of an issue nationwide in the last year. In the last six weeks, Tinnell said, she and her staff have looked at the county's marriage forms and developed new ones to apply to samesex couples.

"We believe we will be ready if we have the direction that this is applicable

> Shuttle voucher program almost

About 20,000 rides would be available through shuttle service

ready for launch

One city official said Havasu is about a month away from launching its new shuttlevoucher program that will replace the now defunct Havasu Area Transit.

The absence of an area transit system in Lake Havasu City has left the several hundred who utilized the service without public transportation since June. The \$1 million service halted May 31 as a result of a series of cuts and the federal government pulling about \$400,000 from the program after Havasu no longer met the population threshold required.

City Manager Charlie Cassens said the city has at least two bids for proposal from private companies for shuttle service to

Lake Havasu City police, animal control, and other residents chased the cow for several hours but it eventually made its way to the desert where it was last seen.

"Anytime you got close to it, it got spooked," said Corp. Tyler

It's a big award for a little brewery. Lake Havasu College Brewhouse & Pub earned a bronze medal at this year's Great American Beer Festival, an event that managing owner Lon Weatherson refers to as "the Olympics of beer."

"This is literally the biggest competition in the world," he said. "As a young


brewery, I'm proud we were able to compete with the big dogs."

College Street won the bronze medal in the aged beer category for its "Brother Dewey's Date Night," a beer Weatherson created when he opened the brewery nearly three years ago. Brother Dewev is brewed each year after the date harvest in September,

starting as an amber lager and incorporating locally grown Yuma dates and Belgian candy syrup, along with nutmeg and coriander. The concoction is then stored for about a year to achieve peak flavor, Weatherson said.

"It was developed right when we got off the ground.


